I'd like to thank "Phenix" for having me as a judge! My stand in judging is not the number of studies in awards. What is important for me is that, a study, meeting all the necessary study requirements, appeals to me. Thus, I cannot understand those judges who leave without awards good entries fearing to exceed the number of awarded studies percentage-wise.
I have to say that the current tourney wasn't strong enough, there were quite a few weak studies. I'd suggest "Phenix" get a new study section editor who would be able to bring more study composers to this publication.

From 10 countries 16 composers competed with 24 studies: Argentina (Mario Guido Garcia), Austria (Peter Krug), Czech Republic (Jaroslav Polasek), France (Jean-Luc Seret, Arnaud Hauchard, Joachim Iglesias, Alain Villeneuve, Philippe Rouzand), New Zealand (Emil Melnichenko), Georgia (Iuri Akobia), Germany (Martin Minski), Russia (Pavel Arestov, Vladimir Gerasimov), Slovakia (Lubos Kekely, Mihal Hlinka), Ukraine (Vladislav Tarasyuk).

First off, some remarks:
6516. Vladislav Tarasyuk. It was awarded in another tourney earlier: Uralski Problemist -20, 2013, 1-5 ${ }^{\text {th }}$ honourable mention.
6600. Jean-Luc Seret. Many duals after the 3rd move.
6690. Arnaud Hauchard. Four moves not enough, at least another move is needed here.
